


CERTIFICATE OF LOCATION OF GOVERNMENT CORNER

For the East Quarter Corner of Section 17, Township 141 North, Range 25 West of the 5th Principal Meridian, STATE OF MINNESOTA, County of Cass.


On July 2, 1985, to mark this corner position, we set a 2.5 inch (outside diameter) by 24 inch long galvanized iron pipe with a 3 inch diameter brass tablet, 10 inches below ground surface, and stamped as shown to replace the damaged 1920 monument.

N 48° E, 57.84 feet to a 16d nail in the easterly face of a 11.6 inch diameter Aspen, double blazed and scribed "1/4 S16" and "BT".



S 81° E, 84.61 feet to a 16d nail in the easterly face of a 7.9 inch diameter Aspen, double blazed and scribed "1/4 S16" and "BT".

S 11° W, 21.38 feet to a 16d nail in the easterly face of a 6.5 inch diameter Aspen, double blazed and scribed "1/4 S17" and "BT".

All bearing trees are marked with red enamel, a USFS 54-3 "BEARING TREE TAG", and a 60d spike driven vertically into the base of the baseblaze.

Statement of evidence relative to this corner position is on the back.

STATEMENT OF EVIDENCE: East Quarter Corner of Section 17, Township 141 North, Range 25 West, of the 5th Principal Meridian.

This corner was originally established by Edgar P. Putman and William P. Allen, Deputy Surveyors, in April of 1871. The record of that survey is on file in the Office of the Secretary of State, St. Paul, Minnesota. Their notes indicate that a post was set to mark the corner and referenced by: a 10 inch diameter Tamarack that bears SOUTH 50 degrees EAST, a distance of 28 links (18.48 feet); and a 6 inch diameter Tamarack that bears SOUTH 60 degrees WEST, a distance of 24 links (15.84 feet).

On May 28, 1920, while running a traverse around Section 17 John Curo, R.L.S., set a temporary post at the single proportionate position. This information is contained in his field notes, Hackensack, Minnesota.

John Curo returned to this corner on June 6, 1920, and found an old post. He replaced this post with a 2 inch diameter by 4 foot long iron pipe 2 feet in the ground. This information is contained in his field notes, Hackensack, Minnesota.

In the Supervisor's Office, Chippewa National Forest, Cass Lake, Minnesota, is a Forest Service form 874-9 by Raymond T. Defant, dated January 23, 1940, stating that this corner consists of an iron pipe 12 inches above ground in good condition. It also notes a Metal Location Poster on a fence post, 6 inch diameter and next to the iron pipe.

Ronald Olesen, USDA Forest Service, visited the corner on July 2, 1976. He found a 2 inch diameter iron pipe bent over under a power line and an old rusty Forest Service Location Poster 6 inches below the ground at the corner site. He then established a Forest Service Location Poster on a 14 inch diameter Aspen that bears SOUTH 62 degrees WEST, a distance of 9.7 feet.

On June 5, 1985, a Forest Service survey crew found a 2 inch (outside diameter) rusted iron pipe bent over, with a Road Right of Way post next to it. No evidence of the Original Government Survey was found. They did recover an old fence corner post under the ground next to the iron pipe. They dug up the iron pipe and found it to be 4 feet long.

Although the found iron pipe has been damaged by activity in the area it appears to be in the location as established by John Curo in 1920. Because the found pipe was damaged we replaced it with the monument and witnesses as shown on the front of this form. The records of this survey are on file with the USDA-Forest Service, Chippewa National Forest.
