
Northeast Corner of Section 35, Township 134N., Range 31W., 5th P.M.

V-21

Northeast Corner, Section 35, T.134N., R.31W., 5th P.M.

- 1869 U.S. General Land Office survey set a wood post for this corner and marked the following bearing trees: a 4" Pine N87½E 313 links, an 8" Norway Pine S2W 510 links, and a 10" Norway Pine S27 ¾E 500 links.
- 1907 County Survey Record Book "A", pages 30-31, show a survey by John Curo. He found stumps of original bearing trees. He set a wood post and marked the following bearings.: an 8" Jack Pine N45-45E 50.45', a 10" Jack Pine S73-20E 29.30', a 12" Norway Pine N22-30W 21.15', and an 8" Norway Pine S49-30W 19.10'.
- 1910 On December 13, Curo set an 8"x 8"x 36" stone in a bed of cement and sand.
- 1986 On May 16, Terry Freeman, Cass County Survey Technician, and backhoe operator Glen Williams found the 8" square stone down 0.05' 2' west of the centerline north, in line with centerline east to west. The following bearing trees were marked: a 20" Norway Pine S64E 58.7' and a Poplar N49E 48.25'.
- 1986 On September 17, Terry Freeman and Norman Morris pulled out the stone and replaced it with a cast iron monument set 8" down.
